Supporting Quality Care Through Safer Workplaces

The incorporation of SafeCare BC in January marked the culmination of years of hard work and the involvement of diverse stakeholders. Our incorporation also marks the start of a vital initiative for the long term care sector.

SafeCare BC is a member-funded health and safety association. Our membership is comprised of non-Health Authority long term care employers belonging to the WorkSafeBC classification unit 766011. Our mandate at SafeCareBC is simple: We strive to ensure injury-free safe working conditions for long term care workers through preventative training, education, and resources throughout all of B.C.

Despite its simplicity, it is a bold statement. Within the health care sector, long term care has one of the highest rates of workplace injury claims. The human and financial cost of this reality is significant. Long term care employers pay a WorkSafeBC base rate that is triple that of the health care sector average. Every year, over 2600 workers require time off work due to

a work-related injury. This has far-reaching implications, affecting staff retention, facility costs, staff quality of life, and quality of patient care.

We have our work cut out for us. However, I am confident that together we can make a difference. To that end, I strongly encourage you to engage and make your voice heard. SafeCare BC is your health and safety organization. The research conducted to-date on behalf of SafeCare BC has gone a long way to identifying needs and priorities – but engagement doesn't stop there. We want your input. We want to hear about what works, what doesn't, and what you need to make your workplace safer.

Thank-you to everyone who has been involved thus far. I look forward to working with you as we endeavour to create safer workplaces for long term care workers. Together, we can make a change for the better.

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
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EXHIBITOR HALL FLOOR PLAN

SUPPORTING A STRATEGIC VISION FOR THE BCCPA: AN UPDATE FROM THE CEO (8:50-9:15AM)



Daniel Fontaine, CEO, BC Care Providers Association

The BCCPA hired Daniel Fontaine as its new Chief Executive Officer in January 2013. Since then, the Association has undergone many changes as part of its renewal strategy and ongoing emphasis to provide quality care.

Whether it's the new *Care to Chat* speaker series or a unique approach to government and media relations, Fontaine will talk about a busy year in the continuing care sector – and what lies ahead.

Increasing cost pressures and burdensome red tape remain key areas of concern to not only those receiving care, but to their families as well. By reducing unnecessary and costly red tape, management and front-line staff also see this as

an opportunity to redirect scarce resources back to client care.

Fontaine will provide delegates with a sneak peak of our Seniors Care for a Change red tape reduction report scheduled to be released later this spring. In addition, he will highlight how the BCCPA plans to work with government to improve the effectiveness of the BC Care Aide Registry.

PLENARY A

National Dementia Strategy: What Are We Waiting For?

Abstract:

The statistics are rather dramatic. It is estimated there are just over 500,000 Canadians living with some form of dementia today and the cost to provide them with care is \$15B. Within a generation, that number is expected to climb to over 1.1 million people and the cost of care will skyrocket to over \$153 billion.

Moderated by Kevin Falcon, BC's former Deputy Premier and Minister of Health, our panel will discuss the merits of Canada developing a more formalized national dementia strategy. It will look into what role the federal government could and should be playing when it comes to dementia research and providing front-line services.

Which countries are getting it right and is there anything we can learn from other jurisdictions? Join our diverse set of panelists for what is expected to be a lively and thought-provoking discussion.



Dr. Diane Finegood, President & CEO, Michael Smith Foundation for Health Research

Diane Finegood is CEO for the province's Michael Smith Foundation for Health Research (MSFHR). The Foundation's recent initiatives include engaging with stakeholders to spur creation of a new \$7.5 million partnership award for Alzheimer's research in BC, the province's first health-research strategy, and a provincial support unit for patient-oriented research.

An internationally-recognized health scientist, innovator and communicator, Diane was named one of Canada's 100 Most Powerful Women by the Women's Executive Network and recognized with the Frederick G. Banting Award from the Canadian Diabetes Association. From 2000 to 2008, she served as the inaugural scientific

director of the Canadian Institutes of Health Research's Institute of Nutrition, Metabolism and Diabetes.

Diane made seminal contributions to our understanding of the pathogenesis of diabetes through use of mathematical modeling. She obtained her doctoral degree in Physiology & Biophysics from the University of Southern California, master's degree in Biomedical Engineering from Northwestern University. She is a professor (on leave) in the Department of Biomedical Physiology & Kinesiology at Simon Fraser University.



Claude Gravelle, Member of Parliament (Nickel Belt)

Claude is the NDP Mining Critic and a member of the Parliamentary Health Committee. Since being elected in 2008, Claude has:

- Brought in legislation to protect our communities from foreign takeovers that rob us of jobs and economic benefits;
- Fought for our own independent economic development agency that's free from the Conservatives' political interference;
- Developed the first National Mining Strategy that would ensure we benefit from future mining opportunities such as those in the Ring of Fire; and Introduced legislation for a National Dementia Strategy to deal with Alzheimer's and other dementia-related challenges facing our loved ones.
- Introduced legislation to give grandparents raising their grandchildren 5 and under the same El and Income Tax benefits parents receive

Claude worked for 34 years at Inco and brought up his family in Nickel Belt. He is married to Marie-Claire, and has two adult children and a grand-daughter.

Mimi has more than 30 years' experience as a Senior Health Care Leader, with expertise spanning the acute care sector, complex continuing care, rehabilitation, long-term care and community health.

Mimi joined the Alzheimer Society of Canada in December 2012 as Chief Executive Officer.

She was the Inaugural CEO of the Central West Local Health Integration Network.

Mimi has extensive knowledge and experience as a Board Member on many health care Boards.

Mimi is a recipient of the 'Tony Graham Award' for Excellence in Board Service and the Dean's Philos Award, presented by the University of Ottawa. She is a recipient of the Chairman's Award for Distinguished Services from the Canadian College of Health Leaders and the Regent-At-Large Award and the Regent's Award from the American College of Health Executives.

Mimi holds a B.Sc. in Physical Therapy from McGill University, a Masters in Health Administration and a Diploma in Business Administration from the University of Ottawa. She has published many articles on health care.

Dr. Chris Simpson is President-Elect for the Canadian Medical Association. He is currently professor of medicine and chief of cardiology at Queen's University, as well as medical director of the Cardiac Program at Kingston General Hospital/Hotel Dieu Hospital. Dr. Simpson's primary non-clinical professional interest is health policy—particularly access to care and wait

He serves as the chair of the Wait Time Alliance (WTA) — a federation of 14 medical specialty societies and the CMA — and as chair of the Canadian Cardiovascular Society's (CCS) Standing Committee on Health Policy and Advocacy. He is the lead for the Southeast (Ontario) Local Health Integration Network Cardiovascular Roadmap Project, which developed a regional model of integrated cardiovascular care for southeastern Ontario. He serves on the executive of the CCS (member-at-large) and on the Cardiac Care Network of Ontario board of directors, and is an American College of Cardiology governor.



Moderator: Kevin Falcon, former Deputy Premier and Minister of Health

Mr. Falcon served for 12 years in various senior cabinet positions in the BC government prior to his decision to retire in August, 2012.As Minister of State for Deregulation, Falcon led the BC government's successful effort to reduce unnecessary red tape by more than 40% in government's first mandate. He further served for 6 years as Minister of Transportation and Infrastructure, overseeing the largest transportation capital program in BC history, including the Sea to Sky Highway upgrade, Canada Line, William Bennett Bridge and the Port Mann Bridge, to name but a few. As Minister of Health he led initiatives to improve productivity in the public health care system, such as Patient Focused Funding, supply chain consolidation amongst Health Authorities and support for population based lifestyle and dietary changes. While Minister of Finance Kevin led a substantial capital markets outreach effort to promote British Columbia's financial strengths amidst great global

uncertainty. His financial stewardship received broad financial market support and a re-affirmation of the Province's AAA credit rating. Falcon's leadership has earned him recognition several times in Vancouver Magazine's annual ranking of the City's 50 most influential leaders. Falcon is a recipient of the Queen's Diamond Jubilee medal for his significant contributions to British Columbia and Canada. Prior to his public career, Falcon was Vice President of Northwest Investment Properties and received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Simon Fraser University and his real estate education from the University of British Columbia.

Concurrent IA: BC's Residential Care Funding Model - Lessons From Alberta

Abstract:

A tale of two provinces and how they approach funding seniors care. That's what our panelists will be discussing as they provide an in-depth comparison of the funding model used in Alberta as compared to British Columbia. The panel will be moderated by Colin Hansen, BC's former Deputy Premier and Minister of Health.

Does Alberta's model of fixed resident co-payments have appeal in BC? How would the introduction of asset testing change the dynamic of care delivery as it currently exists? Would Alberta's more centralized "one-size-fits-all" approach have any appeal this side of the Rockies?

Our panel comprised of senior Health Authority and Healthcare Executives will explore these questions as well as engage participants in a topic that will leave our delegates with some great food-for-thought.

Concurrent IB: The Cost of Not Being Safe

Abstract:

This session will explore and discuss the potential reasons why 2 similar Long Term Care firms have dramatically different claims history. Resulting from the claims, the direct and indirect costs to the 2 firms will be shared with the audience. Concluding the presentation will be some means to improve injury rate and cost performance.

The session will begin with the introduction of WorkSafeBC followed by the introduction of the 2 sample firms. These firms will be actual current firms in the Long Term Care (Classification Unit 766011) industry not affiliated with the Health Authorities. The introduction will include a brief description of metrics and comparable metrics for the firms. Scatter plots will show the firms relative to each other and to the rest of the industry (minus the Health Authorities). In addition, each firm's injury claims characteristics will be summarized.

The audience will participate in a discussion as to the status of the industry and the potential reasons for the different histories experienced by the 2 sample firms.

The session will continue with WorkSafeBC presenting on the direct insurance costs for the 2 firms, the indirect costs resulting from injuries, the resources available to every firm, and the opportunities for improvement presented to every firm with regards to prevention.

A question and answer period will conclude the session.

Concurrent IC: Transformative Integration: Next Generation Home Care through e-Health

Abstract:

This presentation describes a transformation taking place with Bayshore Home Health, a national home care provider. The transformation is from the industry standard of a manual, paper based system towards Bayshore's Epsilon™ solution, a fully integrated ehealth system that builds upon the Procura mHealth applications so as to streamline all elements of home health care services and operations. The complete transformation includes all elements of the business: referral, intake, scheduling, delivery of care, collection of data, dissemination of information, billing and collections. Outputs from the systems include internal and external reporting, clinical outcomes and program specific reports. Internal administrative resources are optimized by focusing on exception handling and reducing repetitive scheduling tasks as well as those associated with data verification such as time sheet checking. Further efficiencies are obtained through direct system-to-system integration with the government funder and implementation of an innovative portal that allows Community Health Workers to self-schedule, also reducing non-value added scheduling tasks. Multiple organizations were involved in various sub-projects and initiatives of this transformation. The end result is a comprehensive technology platform solution that delivers results for all stakeholders: better quality care and outcomes in the home, lower cost of processing for funders, better data and reporting for government agencies, and a better operating model for Bayshore. This presentation will discuss the challenges and victories along the way, and innovative use of technology to build truly sustainable change in the home care space.

"A departure from conventional models, the Retirement Concepts Innovation Centre (RCIC) for Healthy Aging will consolidate key stakeholders into a collaborative path of discovery"

Currently, both the public and private sector seniors care and service providers are facing extraordinary challenges in provision of optimal care in a sustainable and cost effective way. As a result, it is imperative to find innovative ways to be most efficient and effective while evolving care towards self-guidance. Seniors want control and autonomy and what better way to bring them into the process of research and innovation around seniors care.

Areas of focus will include, but are not limited to the following:

Innovation in Technologies – mobility and care related technologies in seniors care. Examples include – airbags for wheel chairs, home based portable lifts, adjustable stairs.

Discovery through research in Seniors Care – To develop and sustain improved care needs for seniors, with a particular interest in unique and specialty populations, such as mild cognitively impaired. For example, neurological devices to enable assessment and monitoring of pharmaceutical effects on dementia clients or home-based strategies for socialization.

Features include:

- Engage with aging adults and families, clinicians and researchers around opportunities that will improve quality of care through offering leading-edge and efficient services for our populations.
- · Create an environment that allows all users and stakeholders
- · Collaborate and participate in the learning and discovery process as it evolves, including care providers, seniors and families.
- · Expedite the development and commercialization of findings that will influence future of care and service for aging adults.
- Serve as a "Centre" for a number of Learning Institutions and Academics to bring opportunities for collaboration from multi-disciplinary partners, including government, industry and not-for-profit organizations.
- Provide a non-conventional approach that accelerates research and development of new products and services by implementing an 'engaged and influential participant' concept across RC-Owned properties.

Examples of the research under way will be highlighted including initial findings (Falls Prevention, Mild Cognitive Impairment Sensor Tracking, technology enabled independence, Brain Scanners, ROBOT technology, etc.)

Concurrent 2B:

Health and safety training for long-term care: Needs through the eyes of front line staff and employers - SafeCare BC

Abstract:

There are significant health and economic consequences for both employers and staff in the long-term care sector due to high levels of physical and mental health workplace injuries to front line staff. There is a considerable need within the sector to provide occupational health and safety-related training/resources to reduce workplace injuries to staff, enhance the safety of client care and reduce costs to employers.

Through consultation with front line staff and employers and an environmental scan of existing training opportunities, the Howegroup (Wynona Giannasi/Jennifer Hystad) conducted a needs assessment to guide the development of SafeCare BC's training portfolio. The needs assessment examined occupational health and safety training, education and resource needs in the long-term care sector in BC. Key findings will be shared, including:

- Identification of priority health and safety training topics.
- Barriers and success factors for training opportunities, including preferable types/modes of delivery and approaches to meaningfully engage front line staff and employers.



Wynona Giannasi, Partner, Howegroup

Wynona Giannasi leads public sector initiatives to success with an unwavering commitment to communication, stakeholder engagement and effective project management. Before founding the Howegroup, a boutique consulting firm specializing in the public and not-for-profit sector, Wynona led process improvement and change management initiatives for BC's provincial government and agencies. Wynona brings to the Howegroup not-for-profit experience in employment training programs, contract management, evaluation, strategic planning and Board governance. She holds a Masters in Public Administration, with a specialization in performance management, and a Bachelor of Science, both from the University of Victoria.

Wynona has led effective stakeholder engagement at all levels within a multitude of public and not-for-profit organizations. Her unique approach to project management has resulted in the successful implementation of

numerous projects and her commitment to practical evaluations has provided insights into the impact of a multitude of programs and services across the province.

Concurrent 2C: The Use of Technology in Delivering Home Support Services

Abstract:

Beacon Community Services Home Support Program (BCS) has been working with the Home and Community Care Program (HCC) at Vancouver Island Health Authority (VIHA) to use technology in innovative, sustainable and cost effective ways to deliver client centred Home Support care to clients living in the community. Vancouver Island has a diverse population with an elderly demographic well above the Canadian average. Home Support services provide support to clients to live as independently as possible at home and to prevent admission to hospital or a residential care facility. Trials were conducted with clients using various technologies including cell phones (voice and text messaging), bed alarms, door alerts, client wrist band call bells and medic alert type systems. The objectives of these pilot tests included monitoring clients for safety, responding to unscheduled client needs and providing access to care 24 hours/day without needing to provide live-in care. This presentation will describe the methodologies tested and the education and changes in practice for Community Health Workers as they learned to use these new technologies. We will also report on the client outcomes, the key learning's and the results of our evaluation of these trials.



Margaret Kun, Vice President, Home Support, Beacon Community Services

Margaret brings over 30 years of nursing and client centred leadership to her role as Vice President of Home Support at Beacon Community Services in Victoria. Dedicated to excellence in the provision of client care, Margaret has led Beacon's Home Support division for 5years. Margaret has worked in a variety of community based management roles including Manager of Program Improvement and Evaluation for the Home and Community Care Program at Island Health, and in several different positions with Community Care Access Centres and the Ministry of Health in Ontario. Margaret holds an Executive MBA from Rotman School of Business at the University of Toronto and a Bachelor of Science in Nursing from McMaster University

Concurrent 3A: Effective Interviewing of Residents after a Critical Incident

Abstract:

Over the last decade, there has been a significant increase in care home residents' acuity level and complexity of care. For example, it is estimated that about 80 percent of residents are living with some form of dementia.

In addition to neurocognitive issues (e.g., delirium; neurocognitive disorder due to Alzheimer's disease, Parkinson's disease, Huntington's disease, or traumatic brain injury), residents may have neurodevelopmental challenges (e.g., intellectual disability, autism spectrum disorder) and/or other mental health issues (e.g., generalized anxiety disorder, major depressive disorder). They may also have physical limitations or unique cultural beliefs and practices.

After a critical incident occurs in a care home, residents are frequently interviewed. "According to scientific literature and practical experience, it is clear that, for these interviews to be effective, they must be conducted in a manner that produces uncontaminated information of high quality while minimizing any potential negative impact on the interviewee," says Dr. Cooper, a registered psychologist practising in the forensic area.

During the conference session, Dr. Cooper will discuss a StepWise approach to effective interviewing – a semi-structured method that is used nationally and internationally for a variety of fact-finding and related purposes.

Through the use of practical examples, Dr. Cooper will highlight the importance of preparation (e.g., "knowing" the interviewee before an interview is conducted) and the necessity of developing and maintaining rapport throughout the interview. Dr. Cooper will also discuss the importance of asking memory-compatible questions, which help cue memory without contaminating it, and resident-compatible questions, which take advantage of residents' strengths and avoid areas of weakness.



Dr. Barry Cooper, Ph.D., R. Psych., Director of Research and Development, The Forensic Alliance

Dr. Barry Cooper is a Registered Psychologist in Vancouver, BC, practicing in the forensic arena. A former Senior Psychologist for the Correctional Service of Canada, he is a Psychologist at the BC Forensic Psychiatric Hospital. He is a Clinical Instructor in the Department of Psychiatry at UBC and an Adjunct Professor in the Departments of Psychology at UBC-Okanagan and Simon Fraser University. Additionally, Dr. Cooper is in private practice which involves assessment and consultation services. He is also a founding Partner and Director of Research and Development in the Forensic Alliance, a research, training, and consulting company. Dr. Cooper's interests include investigative interviewing, memory, credibility assessment, special needs, and risk assessment. He has provided training to various groups including mental health and criminal justice professionals. Dr. Cooper has also provided evidence at Review Board hearings and has served as an expert witness in court for both the prosecution and defense.

Concurrent 4B: SafeCare BC - A Dialogue with the New Executive Director

Abstract:

Long term care has the highest rate of workplace injuries in the health care sector, and indeed of any industry in British Columbia. Consequently, long term care employers pay an average WorkSafeBC premium that is more than three times higher the health care sector average. Nearly \$17 million in claim costs are paid annually in B.C., with over 2600 long term care workers requiring time off work due to an injury.

In response to these challenges, SafeCare BC was established as an industryfunded independent health and safety association. SafeCare BC's incorporation in January 2014 marked the culmination of efforts by numerous stakeholders, including WorkSafeBC, the BC Care Providers Association, the Denominational Health Association, care provider employers, and care provider employees and their representatives.

SafeCare BC's mandate is to reduce injuries among long term care workers through the provision of resources, education, and tools to its members. Membership in SafeCare BC is automatic, based off of WorkSafeBC's classification unit system. Employers belonging to the classification unit 766011 (facilities that act as a primary residence and provide 24-hour care to their residents) are members.

Health and safety associations have proven successful in reducing workplace injuries, both in health care and in other industries. Safety initiatives by go2, the B.C. hospitality and tourism sector's association, have demonstrated that industry-specific programming can cut injuries among participating employers by up to 68%. In Alberta, the long term care sector's Continuing Care Safety Association reports an industry-wide reduction of 20% in workplace injuries and a 34% decrease in industry WCB premiums since its inception.

The success of these associations is founded in a collaborative, industry-focused approach. SafeCare BC will build on lessons learned from other associations to effectively address long term care sector needs. SafeCare BC's Executive Director, Jennifer Lyle, invites conference attendees to participate in a dialogue on SafeCare BC, to share their input, and to learn about the association's next steps.



Jennifer Lyle, Executive Director, SafeCare BC

TUESDAY CONCURRENT SESSIONS

Concurrent 5A: Pain Management in Seniors

Abstract:

Purpose & Methods: In this interactive panel session, a geriatric client case involving pain management will be presented. Session attendees will be encouraged to participate with open discussion, to identify and share challenges as well as question myths about pain in geriatrics. The case will review pain management in several levels of geriatric care, from home care to residential care, including care transitions in and out of hospital. The panellists will guide the discussion to share strategies and clinical tips, as well as spark clinical inquiry.

Objectives: Specific clinical pearls will be highlighted throughout the session, which can be implemented by attendees into their individual practice, as well as shared with colleagues and managers. The underlying theme is improving the quality of life of the geriatric resident living with pain through client-focused care. Attendees will be motivated to exercise critical thinking in seniors' pain management, thus "Changing the Face of Pain".



Kim Knight, Clinical Pharmacist, Victoria General Hospital

Concurrent 5B

A Fine Balance – Fostering Independence and Involvement in Decision Making with Adults in Need of Service from the PGT

Abstract:

Home and residential care members of the BC Care Providers Association have multiple reasons to contact the Public Guardian and Trustee of BC (PGT). There may be a concern that an adult is experiencing abuse, neglect or self-neglect and their finances are at risk resulting in the need for an investigation by the PGT. There may be concerns that an adult is mentally incapable and in need of someone, possibly the PGT, to help them manage. An adult may need health care but they are incapable of making the decision, have no available family or friends who can do it for them, and need the PGT to authorize someone or as a last resort to make the health care decision.

Through the use of stories this session will illustrate the role of the PGT in investigations, as a Committee of Estate, and in health care decision making. The session will also review the impact of a new legal requirement in the *Patients Property Act*, "A guardian must to the extent reasonable, foster the independence of the adult and encourage the adult's involvement in any decision making that affects the adult."

This session will provide a PGT practice update in all three areas, including enhancements being made to the Certificate of Incapability process that makes the PGT an adult's Committee of Estate. These enhancements are resulting from the anticipated proclamation of Part 2.1 of the Adult Guardianship Act and a recent Ombudsperson's Report, "No Longer Your Decision".



Leanne Dospital, Regional Manager, Public Guardian and Trustee of BC

Leanne Dospital is a Regional Manager with the Public Guardian and Trustee of BC (PGT) and is the management team lead for preparing the PGT for Part 2.1 of the Adult Guardianship Act. She is also the provincial lead for assessment and investigations and health care decision-making. Leanne has 20 years of experience in social service work with the BC Government and not-for-profit organizations.



Alison Leaney, Provincial Coordinator, Vulnerable Adults Community Response, Public Guardian and Trustee of BC

Alison Leaney is the Provincial Coordinator, Vulnerable Adults Community Response at the Public Guardian and Trustee of BC where she has spent 17 years in implementation of BC's adult guardianship legislation. Alison is a registered social worker responsible for linking the work of Services to Adults at the PGT with the external community and in this capacity facilitates numerous education/training events, working groups and meetings to address systems issues to enhance service.

Concurrent 5C Silver Alert: Local & First Responders' Perspectives

Abstract:

A senior with dementia wanders away from a care home and becomes the subject of region-wide search and tops the local newscast. Is there more that could be done for them beyond mobilizing first-responders and organizing local search teams?

The concept of a Silver Alert was first introduced in the United States and is based on the highly visible and successful Amber Alert program.

Proponents of a new Silver Alert system in B.C. believe it would save lives and better coordinate limited resources. Meanwhile, there are also concerns that this type of a system developed through legislation may result in "alert fatigue" and become counter-productive in the long run.

Our five panelists will explore both the merits and pitfalls of introducing a silver alert in BC. Each have a unique perspective on how the current system to locate missing seniors is working and whether a new alert system would improve outcomes.

Chief Superintendent Bill Fordy, Surrey RCMP

A Conversation with B.C.'s First Seniors Advocate

Abstract:

Following public consultations across the province, the BC government introduced Bill 10, the Seniors Advocate Act, making B.C. the first province in Canada to pass legislation to create an Office of the Seniors Advocate.

In April the Province of British Columbia announced that Isobel Mackenzie would become the Seniors Advocate. She has over 18 years of experience working on behalf of seniors at a local, provincial and national level. The appointment of a seniors advocate fulfils a commitment made in the government's Seniors Action Plan.

According to the Ministry of Health "the Office of the Seniors Advocate will monitor seniors' services, promote awareness and work collaboratively with seniors, families, policymakers, service providers and others to identify solutions to systemic issues and make recommendations to government on ways to improve care for our aging population."

What should the Seniors Advocate be putting on their priority list in the months to come? How do they maintain their independence and also report directly to the Minister of Health? What will be considered as successful outcomes?

Isobel Mackenzie, B.C. Seniors Advocate

Isobel Mackenzie was appointed as British Columbia's first Seniors Advocate on March 19, 2014. In this new role, Isobel serves as an independent advisor to the Minister of Health and acts as a strong voice for BC seniors. She is responsible for monitoring seniors' services, promoting awareness of seniors' issues and supports, and working collaboratively to identify solutions and make recommendations about systemwide issues facing seniors.

Isobel is the former Chief Executive Officer of Beacon Community Services. Under her leadership, Beacon Community Services grew from a small local agency to British Columbia's largest not-for-profit community and senior-serving organization. While at Beacon, Isobel introduced a new model of dementia care (Licensed Dementia Care) that became a national best practice. She also spearheaded a provincially coordinated approach to the training of care aides in the community. Her many accomplishments and contributions have been recognized by Business in Vancouver who named her BC CEO of the Year in the Not-for-Profit Sector.

Isobel serves on the University of Victoria Board of Governors and has been an active member of several boards, such as the BC Care Providers, the Canadian Home Care Association, the Medical Services Commission and the Capital Regional District Housing Corporation.

Isobel holds a Bachelor of Arts degree and a Master of Business Administration degree from the University of Victoria, and a Certificate in Health Care Leadership from the University of Toronto.
