Chargeable Extras (Wheelchairs)

In follow-up to our memo of January 4, 2016 we are pleased to provide information on one-time funding for basic wheelchair inventory purchases, and to confirm our understanding and approach to resident charges for assessments for basic wheelchairs.

The Interior Health Authority has identified one-time funding of \$214.71 per eligible bed. This funding is to be used for purchasing wheelchair, cushion, and parts inventory for basic wheelchairs. The funding will be distributed before March 31, 2016 and the Authority will require documentary evidence to account for the spending of the funds by September 30, 2016.

The Ministry of Health has also prepared a wheelchair fee table, inserted below and attached separately, intended to clarify who is responsible for costs associated with wheelchairs and to be a reference for providers and staff. It is important to note that some information in the table differs from the Wheelchair Policy Interpretation Guide published when the policy was first put into effect. The Ministry will be updating and circulating a revised Interpretation Guide later in March or April.

With regard to assessments for basic wheelchairs, the Interpretation Guide provided by the Ministry states that

"service providers may charge assessment and determination fees (therapist fees and related expenses) associated with basic, modified and specialized wheelchairs. Service providers must inform and receive consent from clients and/ or their family prior to charging the fees."

If partners are charging assessment and determination fees for basic wheelchairs, evidence must be available to demonstrate that time charged to clients is separate and distinct from the hours funded through the service agreement.
